NeoVIM Basics

- To start Neovim from the Shell, type nvim FILENAME
- Pressing <esc> places you in "normal mode"
- Check VIM's health :checkhealth
- To exit Vim, discarding changes :q!
- To exit Vim, saving changes :wq!
- Tutorial :Tutor
- To undo changes, press <esc> then u
- For help :help

Navigation

- h Scroll Left
- j Scroll Down
- k Scroll Up
- 1 Scroll Right

Editing

- To delete the character under the cursor ${\bf x}$
- To insert text, press i. To exit this mode, press <esc>
- To append text, press a. To exit this mode, press <esc>

Deletion Commands

- Type dw to make a word delete.
- Type d\$ to delete from the cursor to the end of the line.
- Type de to delete to the end of the current word.

Counting Motions

- The format for a change command is:
 - operator [number] motion
- Typing a number before a motion repeats it that many times.
- Type 2w to move the cursor 2 words forward.
- Type **3e** to move the cursor to the end of the 3rd word forward.
- Type 0 to move to the start of a line.

Deleting Using Counts

- Typing a number with an operator repeats it that many times.
- Type d_{2w} to delete the next 2 words, or d_{3w} for 3.
- Type dd to delete a whole line, or 2dd to delete 2 lines.

The Undo Command

- Press x to delete the character where the cursor is at.
- Press u to undo the last command. Or U to undo the whole line.
- Press <CTRL>+r to redo an undo.

The Put Command

- Type **p** to put previously deleted text after the cursor.
- You can also put text before the cursor with P.

The Replace Command

• Type **rx** to replace the character where the cursor is located with x. Replace x with the appropriate character.

The Change Operator

- Typing ce will replace the rest of the word from the cursor location.
- Notice that ce deletes the rest of the word and places you in insert mode.
- The change operator is a change command like delete.
 - c2w
 - c5\$
 - c3e

Cursor Location and File Status

- Press <CTRL>+g to see your location in a file and the file status.
- Press G to move to the end of a file.
- Press gg to move to the beginning of a file.
- Enter the line number followed by G to go to that location, ex: 145G to go to line 145.

The Search Command

- Type / followed by a phrase to search for said phrase.
- Type ? followed by a phrase to search in the reverse direction for said phrase.
- To search for the same phrase again, simply type n. To search in the reverse direction, type N.

Matching Parentheses Search

- Place the cursor over (, {, or [and type % to find the matching one.
- This is very useful for debugging unmatched parenthesis and brackets.

The Substitution Command

- Type :s/old/new/g to search for a word and replace it. g means global, and will replace every instance of that word on the line.
- To change every occurrence of a character string between two lines, type :#:s/old/new/g where
 :# are the numbers of the range of lines. :1,3:s/old/new/g
- Type :%s/old/new/g to replace every occurrence in the whole file.
- Type :%s/old/new/gc to find every occurrence in a whole file, and prompt whether to substitute each occurrence.

Executing an External Command

- Type :! followed by the command (including arguments) and press <enter>.
- All : commands are executed when you press <enter>.

Writing to a File

• To write to a file, type :w filename

Visual Selection

- With cursor at the beginning of a line, press v and scroll to the bottom of where you wish to select.
 Press : At the bottom of the screen, : '<, '> will appear. To save to a file, type w filename directly after.
- Pressing v starts the visual selection. Pressing the operator determines the action. d will delete everything.

Retrieving and Merging Files

- To retrieve the comntents of a file, press :r filename.
- You can also retrieve the output of an external command: :r !ls -a.

The Open Command

• Type a lowercase o to open a line in insert mode below the cursor. Type an uppercase 0 to open a line in insert mode above the cursor.

The Append Command

• Type a to append text after the cursor. A appends at the end of the line.

Replace Mode

- Replace mode is like Insert Mode, but every typed character replaces a character.
- Type R, enter the replacement text and press <esc> when done.

Copy and Paste Text

- Start in visual mode (m), select all of the text you wish to copy. Press y. Move the cursor to where you wish to put the text. Press p to put the text after the cursor. Press P to put the text before the cursor.
- You can use y as an operator. yw yanks one word.

Set Option

- Set options for search and substitute commands.
- To ignore case, :set ic.
- To set the hisearch and incsearch options, type :set his is.
- To disable ignoring case, type :set noic.
- To invert the value of a setting, prepend it with "inv", :set invic.
- To remove the highlighting of matches, type :nohlsearch.
- If you want to ignore case for just one search result, consider ending with \c, like so: /ignore\c.

Getting Help

• Press the <F1> key or type :help for any command.
